

When Chance Meets the Spirit

Sometimes things come together by chance, a fluke, or just luck. And sometimes—or every time—the Holy Spirit is involved.

It all started when a bulletin board came crashing to the floor. The board hadn't been used for much, but one day, as Jessie Bergen was placing something on it, it fell. It was moved aside with the intention of asking someone from the Trustees to find a way to rehang it. But the wall was slightly damaged—as was the board.

Pastor Leah Coleman asked if the Trustees would be open to not replacing the board, but instead painting a mural in its place. They agreed.

The following Sunday during worship, the congregation sang "As the Deer" by Martin Nystrom. As she sang along, Val Cornetet thought, "I've always loved this song. I should paint this—an image of a deer panting for water, drinking from a lake." On her way out of the service, Val shook hands with Pastor Leah, who said unexpectedly, "Val, would you be willing to paint a mural on that angled wall over there?" She pointed to the spot where the bulletin board had once hung. Val was taken aback—she had just envisioned a painting of that very idea moments before. And now she was being asked to bring it to life as a mural. She said yes. A week later, in September 2023, Val attended a Women's Spiritual Retreat at Buckhorn Camp and took the opportunity to photograph a mountain lake to use as inspiration for her painting.

A Trustee volunteered to prep the wall, placing a cover plate over an outlet. At first, Val thought she could paint directly on the rough surface. But during a conversation about it, Larry Glover happened by and offered, "I could smooth this wall for you—sand and prime it to be a better background for the painting."

And he did.

Within the next month, Val mapped out her vision on paper, selected her colors, brought her step stool, and got to work. She began with a pink-toned background—hints of which peek through the finished mural. Day by day, she added more detail: mountains, a lake, and finally, the deer. She borrowed the technique of using rags in addition to brushes to apply and blend the paint, and was happy with the results. Each day, as people passed through the hallway, they noticed the water begin to shimmer, and the deer begin to drink. Val added the words of Psalm 42:1. "As the deer panteth for the water, so my soul thirsteth for you, O Lord."

After applying a final protective seal, the mural was complete. It took just four days.

How did all of this come together, you ask?

The Holy Spirit is alive and well at Christ United Methodist Church.
