Each fall, United Methodist congregations across the connection are invited into a season of prayerful reflection about stewardship. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, often spoke of stewardship as a matter of holy living. He urged believers to "earn all you can, save all you can, give all you can." That rhythm of generosity is not about obligation but about joy—the joy of knowing that what we share in faith has eternal impact.

As we enter this year's stewardship campaign, let us approach it not with hesitation but with gratitude and hope. Gratitude for the ways God has already provided, and hope for the ways God will continue to use us to bring light and life into the world.

Together, as a church family, let us prayerfully consider how we can respond to God's blessings with generosity. May our stewardship be a living testimony that we are indeed the hands and feet of Christ in the world.



MONDAY 9:30 A.M. BIBLE STUDY:



Seekers Bible Study




We have begun a NavPress study of John's Revelation.

Congregational Care Team


The goal of the Congregational Care Team (CCT) is to reach out to those in our community of faith who have special needs and to help make our church a friendly, nurturing faith community.

Raise Your Voice: Why We Stay Silent and How to Speak Up by Kathy Khang

You have a voice. And you have God's permission to use it. In some communities, certain voices are amplified and elevated while others are erased and suppressed. It can be hard to speak up, especially in the ugliness of social media. Power dynamics keep us silent and marginalized, especially when race, ethnicity, and gender are factors. What can we do about it? Activist Kathy Khang roots our voice and identity in the image of God. Because God created us in our ethnicity and gender, our voice is uniquely expressed through the totality of who we are. We are created to speak, and we can both speak up for ourselves and speak out on behalf of others. Khang offers insights from faithful heroes who raised their voices for the sake of God's justice, and she shows how we can do the same today, in person, in social media, in organizations, and in the public square. Be silent no more. If you have wondered when and how to speak, hear God's invitation to you to find and steward your authentic voice, whether in word or deed, to communicate the good news in a messed-up world. As you discern God's voice calling you to speak, you will discover how your voice sounds as you express God's heart to others. And the world will hear you loud and clear.

Thanks to all of you who gave extra to help out. We still have an amount we owe to one of our funds that we borrowed from, and the balance is, \$25K. Both June and August show more gifts than expenses and this is helping to reduce the debt that was created earlier in the year. We also continue to look for ways to cut down on expenses.
