

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

As the leaves turn and the air grows crisp, November often invites us into a season of reflection. Thanksgiving, with all its familiar rhythms of gathering, gratitude, and grace, calls us to pause and remember God's faithfulness. In a world that can feel hurried and uncertain, gratitude grounds us. It helps us see that even in times of challenge, there are blessings to be named and hope for tomorrow.

Gratitude and hope are deeply connected. Gratitude reminds us of where God has been faithful; hope reminds us that God's faithfulness continues. Together, they form a rhythm of trust—past, present, and future held in God's steady hands.

The Apostle Paul wrote, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Paul's words don't ignore life's difficulties—they reframe them. He reminds us that gratitude is not about pretending everything is perfect, but about remembering that God is present, working for good even when we cannot see the whole picture.

This November, may we take time to count blessings both big and small: a shared meal, a note of encouragement, a sunrise, a child's laughter, the comfort of our church family. And as we do, may those moments of gratitude open our hearts to hope—hope for healing, for renewal, for the continued movement of God's Spirit among us.

In a world that often points to what's missing, the church is called to point toward abundance—to proclaim that God is not finished with us or with creation. Gratitude roots us in God's grace; hope lifts our eyes toward God's future.

May this season draw us closer to the heart of Christ, who gives us both gratitude for the cross and hope in the resurrection.

May our thanksgiving overflow into acts of kindness, generosity, and love.

A New Phone System at CUMC - Much Needed, Much Appreciated



In September, the church purchased and installed a new phone system. The old system was slowly giving up the ghost and was only partially working, with different issues popping up daily. But it had a good life, and the staff was not sorry to say goodbye. The new system is from Zoom. Zoom Phone is a Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) system. The days of old analog systems with a PBX in the closet are gone. Our old system received power through the internet via Comcast but was not a VoIP system.

Other vendors were reviewed, but Zoom Phone offers the most services for the money and has a good quality rating. The actual phones were purchased with funds set aside for IT upgrades and cost \$455. The monthly charge from Zoom will be approximately \$93 with taxes, and we were paying approximately \$75 with Comcast.

If you hear anything from users about it not being able to do this or that, more than likely it actually does those things and will just require some additional training. There are many Zoom videos on YouTube about the phones, as well as a chat window available through our Zoom account.

Because the system operates through the internet, more phone lines may be added in the future using Wi-Fi. We hope this choice will be flexible for our needs going forward.

A big thank-you goes to Susie McCollum for agreeing to be our Phone Installation Hero—and on short notice! She worked closely with the staff, the Zoom representatives, and Mark Herndon from iPoint Technologies, our local IT professional. Together, they figured it out, got the number ported from Comcast, and had it up and running. We'd also like to thank Brenda Thompson, who worked closely with Comcast to change our old account without an increase in costs, even though we lost our "bundle" pricing.

Our volunteers on the Trustees committee are wonderful! Thanks to all.



"ALL THAT IS SECRET" by Patricia Raybon.

An exciting "history mystery" featuring a young Black theologian—a fan of Sherlock Holmes—who solves crimes during Colorado's dangerous 1920s Klan years. In the winter of 1923, Professor Annalee Spain receives a cryptic telegram calling her home to Denver to solve the mystery of the murder of her beloved but estranged father. For a young Black woman, searching for answers in a city ruled by the KKK could mean real danger. Still, she launches her hunt for clues, attracting two surprising allies and following clues that land her among Denver's powerful elite.
