This season meets each of us differently. Some of us arrive rejoicing, while others carry grief, uncertainty, or quiet burdens known only to God. We often think of traveling in terms of the destination. The moment someone announces they are heading out of town, the first question is usually, "Where are you going?" Destinations help shape our plans, but it is the journey that forms us. The unexpected moments, the delays, the beauty along the way—these become the memories that linger long after the trip is over.

This Advent, we will pay attention not only to the destination of Christmas but also to the places along the biblical journey that led to that star-lit night in Bethlehem. These locations remind us that God's work unfolds "on the way"—in the long roads, the waiting rooms, the quiet towns, and the humble spaces where God's promises take root. As we reflect on these holy places, we will also consider our own milestones—the progress, the detours, and even the potholes that shape our path.

Rome: A Place of Longing (Hope)
Jerusalem: A Place of Waiting (Peace)
Nazareth: A Place of Simplicity (Joy)
Bethlehem: A Place of Humility (Love)

The Manger: A Place of Care Persia: A Place of Return

May this Advent journey draw us deeper into the story of God's love—leading us not only to the cradle in Bethlehem but also to a renewed sense of purpose, wonder, and hope in our own lives.

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Notes from Finance for December 2025 Newsletter

The Finance Committee chose as the theme for 2025, "You Faith Can Move Mountains". Our committee, sees the financial reports each month, with some months showing a pretty significant negative where expenses exceeded income. But this is one of the reasons we chose that theme. We do have faith. We have faith that the money will come, while still being 100% aware that we might fall short and plan for ways to cut expenses when that happens. We believe some amount of "Mountain Moving" took place this year.

Commitment Sunday, 11/2/2025 was the official end of the pledge campaign for 2026. And the finance committee wants to thank everyone who took part and turned in a pledge card. And if you have not yet sent in your card, we will be happy to receive it at any time.

There were 44 pledges received as of the date of this article, with \$184,540 pledged to the operating fund. This is greater than the pledges for 2025 by \$5,560. This is very encouraging. The faith that can move mountains is alive in our congregation. Thank you all who pledged. It is a tangible show of support and faith in this church.

The building fund received pledges of \$24,020, slightly less than for 2025.

The budget for 2026 was approved at the all-church conference on 11/15/2025 and the total is \$313,761. This is down about \$20,000 from 2025. You can see the details of this budget in the all-church conference book available in the office. Many people helped gather the figures for the budget and we are thankful for their input.

As with most churches, the pledge campaign does not bring in as many promised dollars as the budget plans to spend. How does this then work out? First, the Holy Spirit has a hand. The Spirit moves among us and in our community. This can mean new givers, additional pledge cards turned in, and current members seeing a need and finding ways to bridge that gap. We pray that those of you reading this today will find it in your heart to continue to support our church in any ways that feel right to you.
